
Establishing Respectful Relationships and Consent

Celebrating Black History



February's Black History Month is an opportunity to celebrate the many achievements and contributions of Black Canadians and their communities who have contributed to the culturally diverse and prosperous nation Canada is today. The legacy is long with significant contributions in the arts, education, government, sciences, and sports. The month also provides an opportunity for us to reflect on what it means to live in a world with diverse identities, voices and stories. Our students are encouraged to check out the Library Learning Commons' book display where students can read memoirs and books from Black authors and find out more about the legacy of important events in Black history. Students can learn more about prominent Black Canadians and Americans by scanning QR codes found in the interactive display outside the LLC. Included in this collection is Harry Jerome, a gifted athlete and track star and world record holder, who won an Olympic Bronze Medal at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics while teaching at Richmond High. Harry taught math and science at our school from 1964-1965.

Sharing Our Learning

Miyawaki Pocket Forest at Richmond Secondary

Why is the MPF important to me? Why am I passionate about it? What have we done?

My name is Serena and I am the Co-President of the Richmond Secondary Green Team. It has always been of utmost importance to me to create tangible, impactful change. To be able to achieve such things in my position as the leader of a club; from getting a Just Transition petition tabled to running awareness campaigns, is incredible. The magnitude of resonance created by this Miyawaki Pocket Forest Project is comparable to very few things and it has made all those involved in the project better leaders, citizens, and caretakers of the Earth.

The Miyawaki Pocket Forest is designed to be a hub of biodiversity; ours contains over 30 different species local to Richmond and Oregon, planted at a density of 3 plants per square meter over an area of 100 square meters. We expect our forest to grow as much as 10x faster as opposed to the traditional 1-2 metres per year, harbour 100x more natural biodiversity due to the 20-30x more densely our forest is planted. Traditional afforestation techniques space their trees at a density of 1000 per hectare (10 000 square metres) while the Miyawaki Method puts 20 000 - 30 000 per hectare. Old-growth forests are especially endangered in BC - they take centuries to develop their complex and resistant ecosystems. Our aim with the Miyawaki Forest is to cut down on this growing time and restore native ecosystems within a few decades' time. More specifically, our Miyawaki Pocket Forest will offer a sanctuary for students and staff by absorbing dust from the air, sound from the nearby road, and carbon emissions. If a seedling with a dry weight of 300-500g grows into a tree around 10-20m tall with a dry weight of 1 ton, at least 40% of its weight is carbon. With the already incredible ability of trees to capture carbon from the environment, the impacts of our Miyawaki Pocket Forest are to be vast.

Prior to the November 19th planting, we ran propagation workshops, educational workshops for our feeder elementary schools (Ferris and Brighouse), and an Earth Day and Equinox Celebration. Up until now, the Miyawaki Pocket Forest has truly been a work in progress - from a meeting with our core group of leaders on the Wednesday before the 19th to hammer out final details such as the catering, to going to the nursery to label the last of the plants on Friday. My day started at 6:00 AM with finalizing the species list and preparing the volunteer sign-in and plant check-out. Throughout the day, our core group worked hard on directing volunteers to their assigned plots, reporting the species at each plot, recording the plants that were taken out, etc. We all wore many different hats that day and ran around attending to different issues that came up, but all in all, it was a wonderful day for everyone.

To see so many people from different backgrounds: Richmond Secondary students, FedEx workers, family and friends, politicians, school board trustees, and many others come together on November 19th was a powerful image. In no other situation would so many people who were so different come together and bond over something they all cared about. This foreshadowed the community-building that was to come from our Miyawaki Pocket Forest. As leaders, we want to make people feel personally connected to what they do, and having volunteers involved in the whole process of planting was a great experience. To know that our project brought together so many people and unified the community over a project so large was incredible.










Student Learning Survey
